Our Vice-President, Wayne Lane, has been very busy these last three months authoring an article for Air Line Pilot magazine and narrating books for Audible.





A Great Story from Doug Shaw

The following Tiger tale comes to us from Doug Shaw, former ANC General Manager, about the Tigers B707 N324FT the true star in the iconic 1970 movie Airport.

I came across these old photos of the FTL N324FT B707 painted in "Trans Global Airlines" livery for the movie Airport that might be of interest. I was Supervisor of Catering at Tigers at the time and had gone to MSP to work with Northwest Airlines Flight Kitchen to set up catering for the MSP/LAX return meals (shown in the photos.) Tigers had flown the airplane with the film crew to MSP and left it there with the aircraft mechanic (may be the guy in the

photos) for two-three weeks while working on the movie. For the landing sequence the movie studio flew the Tiger crew back to MSP and when filming wrapped, Tigers then flew the entire film crew on N324FT back to LAX.



A story that you may not have heard had to do with filming the landing that shows a rooster tail of slush being thrown up behind the nose gear. As I recall, George Bock was the Captain (I have forgotten names of the Copilot and FE...F/E May Have been Ray Maxey...and it was he who told me the story.) The scene was to simulate a landing by doing a high speed taxi and then a turn off to the taxiway. A film crew had been placed in a tower at the end of the runway to film a "heads on" shot. The weather was typical for MSP winter and the runway had been plowed but there was a light snow turning to slush by the time they were ready for the filming.

The camera crew were in the tower and the high speed taxi started with the plan to slow and make a right turn onto the second taxiway. When George tried to slow, there was enough slush that the N324FT slid past the turn off with the nose wheel cocked for the turn, which created a huge "rooster tail" of slush. The airplane continued to slide with the last chance for a turn off coming up before it would go through the fence and into the camera tower! The camera crew decided they had no where to go so they continued to film.

At the last minute George felt the right brake start to grab and quickly applied power to the left engines to make the turn onto the dry taxiway where he could maintain control. The film director was so excited about the unplanned scene he decided that one take was all they needed and used it in the final production of the movie!

This just maybe another of the untold Tiger stories.
